Research Methodology:

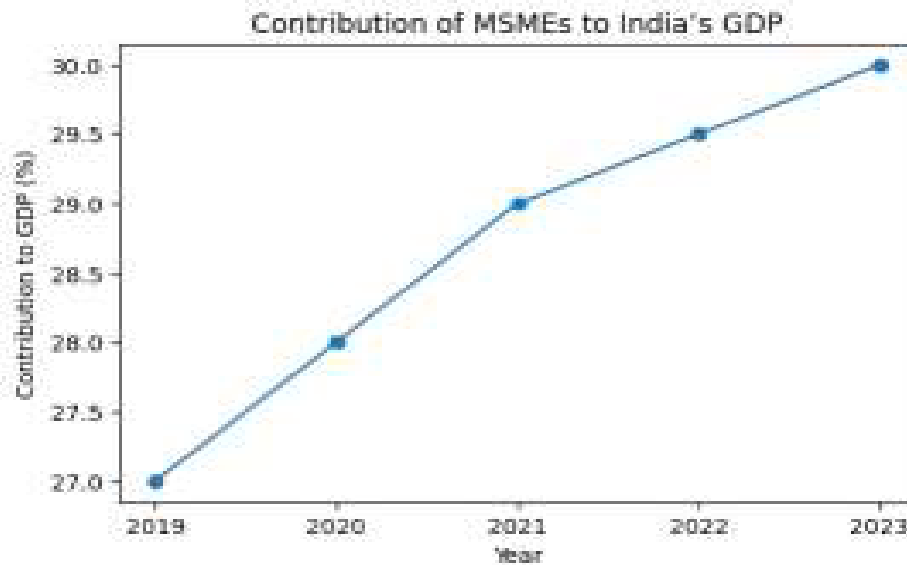

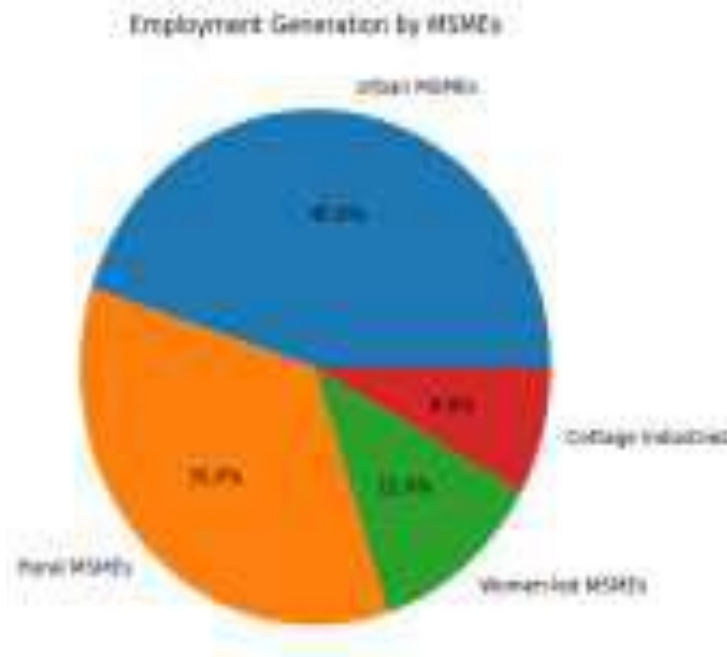
Figure 1: Contribution of MSMEs to India's GDP

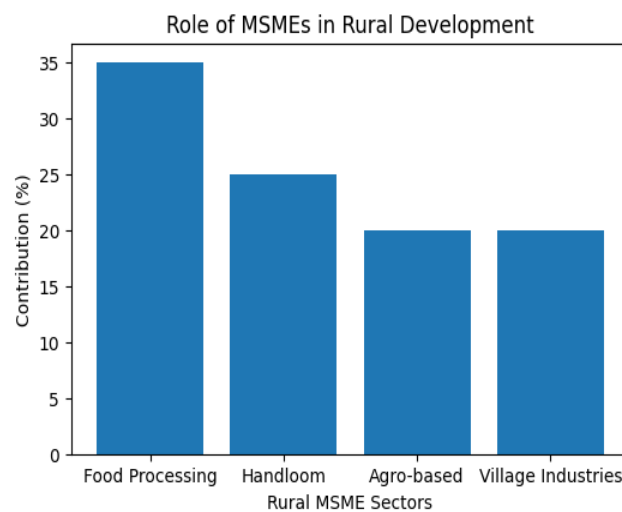
Figure 2: Employment Generation by MSMEs

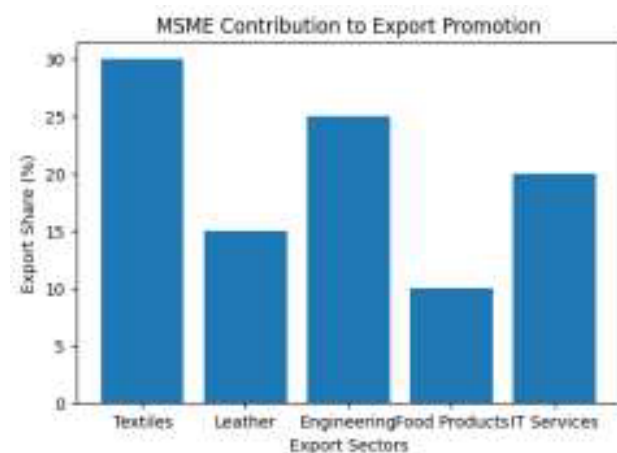
Figure 3: Role of MSMEs in Rural Development

Figure 4: MSME Contribution to Export Promotion

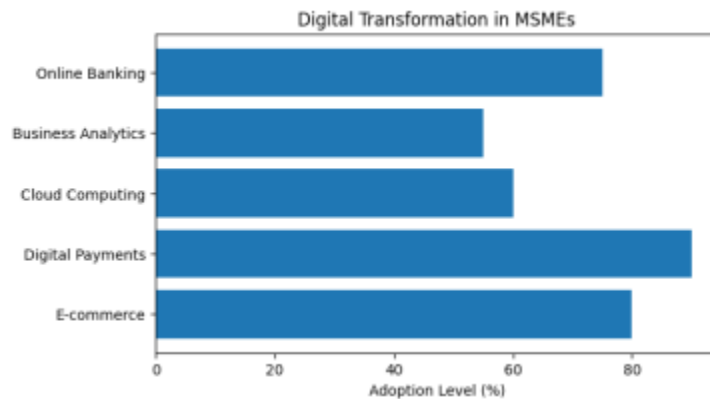


Digital Transformation and Innovation in MSMEs

Challenges Faced by MSMEs

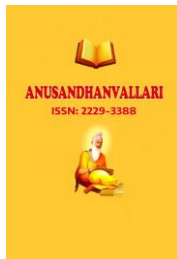
Despite their importance, MSMEs face several persistent challenges, including:
